Dear Resident,

We are writing to thank you very much for supporting all our fundraising efforts for the restoration of the East Chancel stained glass window and the repair of the surrounding stonework at St George's Church, Shimplingthorne.

We are extremely happy to report that we have now raised a total of £51,566! This is thanks to all your support at fundraising events, to individuals who have generously donated to the fund, to six different charities who have awarded us grants, a grant from the Suffolk County Council Locality Budget as well as the use of PCC reserves.

We have just £2,444 left to raise to reach our target of £54,000. This target seemed very hard to reach back in September when we started the project, but we are almost there, thanks to your help and support.

Permission has been granted by the Archdeacon, drawings and specifications have been completed by the architect, a condition report has been completed by the glazier, a 'bat survey' has been carried out, as well the mandatory asbestos survey, the bees have been removed and the necessary Construction, Design and

Management (CDM) measures are all in place. We are ready to go!

Following a tendering process, the contractor R.J. Hogg, from Coney Weston was awarded the contract and Auravisions from Saffron Walden will carry out the glazing work. Work will commence on 2<sup>nd</sup> September 2024 and we look forward to seeing the progress over the subsequent four months. We hope the work will be completed just in time for the Christmas Eve Carol Service.

The first stage of the work will be erecting the scaffolding both inside and out and completely removing the window. The church will remain open throughout the building works and Sunday services will take place as usual. We hope you will all come along and enjoy the restored window when it is completed.

Our final fundraiser is going to be a sponsored bike ride by Mark Beaver who will be cycling the length of Portugal in October. It will take Mark 8 days to ride from Chaves to Faro in Portugal. Please do look out for the publicity about this amazing cycle ride by Mark and support him in this great adventure.

## Shimpling Village vs Chadacre Cricket Match 30th June

Pre Match

As the team began to arrive at Chadacre, the slightly overcast conditions did little to dampen the excitement of having the opportunity to play at this unique cricket setting. The matchday squad was 13 strong after some last minute recruitment efforts at both Lawshall School's sports day, and then later on at The Bush on Friday evening:

Mark Haselhurst (Captain) – Rarely holds a conversation without asking whether you play cricket. Has been known to bat well and bowl well, but seldom on the same day.

Oliver Beeton – Can hit the ball, can catch the ball, can take wickets – an all-rounder if you will.

Gary Cann – When asked whether he was a batter or a bowler, replied "I am a goalkeeper". Every team needs a goalkeeper, whether you play football or not.

David Barnbrook – Will do anything for the team. Will even use his face to stop the ball.

**Andrew Gregory** – Shimpling royalty and our link to the last match at Chadacre.

Justin Bone – Co-founder (with the Captain) of a previous Shimpling Cricket Club WhatsApp group formed 3 years ago following a session in the pub but soon disbanded with just two players (themselves) enlisted. We got there in the end though!

Charlie Chapman – An 18 year old rugby player, who spares no prisoners with bat or ball.

**David Page** – Never been known to drop a catch. Useful source of replacement fielders.

Rafe Page – Our 11 year old superstar and chief sledger. Felix Brouder – Only 16 years old but a talent with both bat and ball (it was just a shame he was displaying it for the opposition rather than Shimpling).

Rich "Murf" Murfitt – Unwittingly recruited after poor seating choice at a Christmas do saw him stuck opposite the Captain for over 2 hours, by which time he found himself added to at least two cricket WhatsApp groups.

George Young – An old friend of the Captain who can sniff out an opportunity to play cricket at least 3 counties over, even it means a 4 hour round trip.

Adam Dunkley – Son of Shimpling resident David, Adam (London based) was volunteered to play by his father when cornered by the Captain in The Bush one evening.

On learning the opposition only had 10 players, we made the difficult decision to offer up Felix to make it XI vs XI. Our 12<sup>th</sup> man, Rafe, was originally only going to sub on occasionally and do a bit of fielding for us, but as it would turn out he had a much bigger role to play.

The Chadacre team was captained by Harry Lamprell who confirmed a two innings match, with each innings being 20 overs. After some quick calculations, it started to become clear that getting to The Bush in time for kickoff of the England vs Slovakia Euros football match was going to be challenging. A solution would no doubt present itself. The villagers started to arrive and there was a tangible buzz around the ground. Just prior to the start of play the sun broke out and the spectators, bravely led by Kris and Del, began their assault on the amply stocked bar. The coin was tossed and Shimpling were put into bat. Let play commence!

Shimpling 1<sup>st</sup> Innings (96 runs) Mark and David B were Shimpling's opening batsmen and the innings got off to a cracking start as the first ball was dispatched to the boundary for 4 runs. Another boundary followed shortly afterwards and the over ended with a single - Shimpling were cantering along nicely with 9 from the first over. The second over was less productive and David sadly fell to a tricky delivery. It was clear David had more to offer, which the second innings would go on to prove. Murf came to the crease and played some nice strokes before also succumbing to some handy bowling. Chadacre were clearly no mugs and were picking us off at a slightly alarming rate. Gary was next up but he was unable to stem the tide. Despite the menace with which it was swung, the bat was refusing to connect with the ball and a straight delivery saw to his premature demise. One of our 'out of town' selections, George, was next to join Mark in the middle. George dug in to bring the match back in our favour as Mark continued to swing the bat with increasing volatility at the other end. Fortunately, a sufficient number of his shots were managing to find the gaps in the field and Shimpling's total had moved past the 50 mark. Some hesitant running almost saw Mark return to the pavilion, before his luck finally ran out on the next delivery with an illadvised swing at a ball that should have been shown a great deal more respect. The Captain departed for 44 runs and Shimpling were 4 wickets down. George followed shortly afterwards but not before striking a beautiful six, drawing a handsome appreciation from the growing number of spectators around the ground. David P, Oli and Charlie all contributed to the score with some very acceptable cricket shots. Andrew was unable to add to our score but, as was to later become apparent, he was clearly

saving his particular brand of cricketing magic for when he had the ball, rather than the bat, in his hands. Rafe, our youngest team member at the age of 11, showed absolutely no fear whatsoever and added some crucial late runs to take our score to 96 after 20 overs. Not bad for our first outing as a team although it felt possibly slightly short of par. Things would become much clearer once we discovered Chadacre's credentials as a batting outfit.

### Chadacre 1st Innings (123 runs)

As thoughts should have been turning towards field placements and ball tampering shining, there were some longing glances towards the refreshments tent. Some searching questions were starting to run through the team's heads such as when might be acceptable to partake in the first beer of the afternoon? These dilemmas were (temporarily) put on the back burner.

The Shimpling team re-entered the fold, 'spaced themselves out a bit' and welcomed the Chadacre openers to the field. Gary had nobly taken on the responsibility of keeping wicket for us and a great performance he put in too, saving us countless runs by stopping many of our wayward bowling deliveries!

Adam and George were first into the attack as we decided to pepper the opening batsmen (and Gary!) with some pace. Our two London recruits did not disappoint, keeping the run rate to an acceptable level before George struck first by removing the opposing captain. Mark replaced Adam (with not a great deal of effect) and then Murf entered the fray, taking two wickets in consecutive balls to set up the first hatrick opportunity of the afternoon. Unfortunately, we were unable to convert it and Chadacre soon started to pile on the

runs with some fierce hitting from their number 3 batsman. Some relief was found after he reached 50 and retired before David B cleverly forced a rather comical hit / walked into wicket moment to remove another of Chadacre's batters. Rafe then got his chance with the ball and boy did he take it. 3 overs, only 7 runs conceded and 2 wickets – what a debut performance, and some fine sledging thrown into the mix too: "More dots than a dalmatian!". Andrew completed our bowling line up, showing clear signs that he was a very capable bowler (which was confirmed emphatically in the second innings). The 20 overs were up and Chadacre had scored 123 for the loss of 6 wickets giving them a 27 run advantage as we headed in for tea.

### Shimpling 2<sup>nd</sup> Innings (121 runs)

Feeling suitably refreshed from an extremely generous and delicious tea (big thanks to the Shimpling organising committee!), it was time to return to the field to chase down Chadacre's total and hopefully post an unassailable lead. Whilst Mark and Justin padded up, batters further down the order were starting to make their presence felt at the drinks tent. Both batsmen looked in decent form with some nice stroke play and running between the wickets before disaster struck on the final ball of the over. Justin misjudged a shot and the ball clattered the stumps. Although the next over started well with a boundary, there was further disappointment when first Oli, and then Andrew, fell in consecutive deliveries. Shimpling were 12 for 3 after two overs and the game looked like it might be slipping away. Thoughts started turning to the England game and whether we might just make it to the pub for kick off after all. Rafe was next to join Mark at the crease, where his father

(David P) who was umpiring warned Mark "Careful, he's run out 5 people this year already!". With that in mind, Mark started to hit out and hit big. Rafe kept him company for a while and showed he clearly has talent with the bat as well as ball, but sadly top edged one and was caught. Charlie was next in and decided to score single, four, single, four and so on, making for a very pleasing sequence in the scorebook. There were some fierce strokes in his innings and the spectators were starting to have to pay much closer attention as the pavilion came under fire. Mark's innings came to a conclusion when he retired after reaching a quickfire 50 which included three crowd pleasing 6s. George was next to the crease but was unable to really get going, before Gary completed his pair after a few more big swings. One day bat will find ball, and I for one want to be there when it happens. This left Murf and the two Davids to bring the innings home and bring it home they did. They each reached double figures with some excellent batting meaning we surpassed our first innings total, ending on 121. Added to our first innings score, we had an overall lead of 94 for Chadacre to chase down. It was going to be tight but we had at least given ourselves a chance.

### Chadacre 2<sup>nd</sup> Innings (79 runs)

Preparations for the final innings were shaken when first Adam had to withdraw to get home to London and then Justin was required to attend to family matters. Rafe was only too willing to continue to take on a much fuller role than he had been promised and Felix was lured back into the team (at least for as long as he wasn't required to bat for Chadacre!). And we were very lucky to have Felix among our number when the ball flew to him in the second over.

Mark began with a relatively tidy first over, conceding just the 2 runs. Then George instigated the fightback with two wickets in his first over, with excellent catches by David B (our new keeper, and only a few balls after stopping one delivery with his eye) and Felix. Chadacre were 6 for 2 wickets after the first 2 overs. A promising start by Shimpling but we knew they had some decent batters to come. Mark repeated his trick with only a further 2 runs coming from his second, before George pulled a wicket maiden out of the bag. The batsman was enticed into hitting towards what he thought was a sparsely covered leg side. Little did he know we had Gary 'safe hands' Cann patrolling the area who swept round and completed an excellent catch. Chadacre were now 8 for 3 off 4 overs. Game on?

Mark made way for Rafe who bowled a beautiful couple of maidens to ramp up the pressure on the home side. George then bowled his final over which culminated with a caught and bowled to round off a four wicket haul. The tide started to turn back towards Chadacre though as their middle order fought back and started to find the boundary.

Oli and Charlie were then given their chance with the ball and they took it. They both got settled in during their first overs before striking in their second. Oli lured the batsman into a risky hit which allowed David P to take his first of two catches, whilst Charlie sent the bails flying with an unplayable delivery. Mark returned and managed to remove one more batsman (David P's second catch – never seen him drop one) which left Chadacre with around 30 runs to chase down but only 3 wickets remaining.

The real problem for Shimpling however, was that Chadacre's best batsmen had been saved to the end. The question was who to turn to now as the match was delicately balanced? The answer was Andrew.

His first over saw them confined to singles and 2s but the batsmen did not look comfortable. His second over delivered two decisive and, for Chadacre, devastating moments. Andrew clean bowled one batsman before having their captain dismissed for a duck by hitting it straight to Mark, who was just able to get enough of his hand under the ball before it landed, to take the catch at mid-off. Hatrick ball at the start of Andrew's next over but a four was struck on the first ball. Anxious glances to the scoreboard once more. Chadacre now only needed 16 runs to win and there were still 17 balls left to get them. Was the pendulum swinging back to Chadacre once more? This could easily go either way.

Except Andrew had other ideas. He clearly sensed one final opportunity to reach the pub before the end of the England game. Andrew ran in, the ball flew towards the wicket, the stumps were clattered, Shimpling celebrated. Result: Shimpling won by 15 runs

### Post-match

The players headed off the pitch for photographs, refreshments and to uphold their media responsibilities. The news had already been relayed that England were losing 1-0 with only a few minutes remaining. Some players had already started their journeys home when news of a late equaliser started filtering through. Hang on, this would mean a further 30 minutes of football to enjoy... to the pub! Some hasty U-turns were made and a good number of the team re-assembled at The Bush where we were pleased to discover that Kris and Del were still very much leading the charge. Even young Rafe made it, proudly clutching the

match ball – a fitting end to a wonderful day for our village, where we were able to not only enjoy a game of cricket and raise important funds for the Church, but also enjoy each other's company.

Shimpling and Alpheton WI have had a very busy last 3 months. In June we held our annual garden meeting in the garden of one of our members. Often the weather intervenes and we end up in the member's house. On this occasion we



were very uncertain whether we could be in or out as the grey clouds looked very threatening and rain had been forecast, but thanks to a wonderful open fronted summer house we decided to risk it! It was well worth that risk because the rain held off and we were treated to being immersed in the beautiful and impeccably tended garden of Sue Tatum in Shimpling with her enviable open views onto Shimpling Park farmland. We also tucked into our traditional summer garden meeting fare of luscious strawberries, big fat raspberries, shortbread and cream. Our president had just been to the Royal Albert Hall for the 2024 Annual Conference of the WI. She was able to report back to us about what she heard there and about the vote on the annual resolution. One of the things which appeals to many WI members is the fact that through lobbying and campaigning, WI members have a voice on issues in the national interest. This year we approved a resolution to campaign for better dental healthcare for all nationwide. In July our speaker was Lewis Turner talking fascinatingly about a year in beekeeping illustrated by some awesome photographs which Lewis had taken himself. Think twice when you next open a jar and savour your honey: one honeybee produces only about 1.5 teaspoons of honey during its lifetime having possibly flown 5 miles each day reaching speeds in excess of 15mph! A bee can make more than 10 trips every day, visiting as many as a hundred or so

flowers each trip and carrying up to a quarter of its body weight in pollen. Also in July we visited the Bury branch of Suffolk Record Office. We were welcomed and enjoyed a PowerPoint presentation about the work that the record office does, which showed us different types of documents that they hold with examples of documents from Bury St Edmunds. We were split into two groups with one visiting the vault where the documents are held at a regulated temperature. It was full of special storage boxes and these will be moving to Ipswich when this office closes in August. The other group looked at documents about Shimpling and Alpheton. One of the documents was the first ever meeting book for our own WI which started 19th November 1949. It was so interesting to look at the names from then and how many of us remembered them. There were also logbooks from Shimpling School and old maps from both villages. We were shown documents about Chadacre Agricultural Institute and pictures from the Millennium survey that Paddy Trevellyan and Steph Eady completed in Alpheton at the turn of the century, both of whom are past Presidents. There was so much to look at and digest. The groups then swapped over. Both groups thoroughly enjoyed both parts of the tour. It was interesting to see some of the two villages' history and some members are keen to go and research more. In August instead of a speaker we visited the Yum Yum fudge Company in Woolpit. Although a small enterprise they are very proud of their negative carbon status. It was started by a couple using their own secret recipes which use much more dairy content than most fudges, and is therefore creamier and less sweet. They are passionate about fudge and that showed through the tour. We saw all stages of production at their gleamingly squeaky clean eco friendly

site and the 5 fudge making team members were eager to show us every aspect of their creations. The range of flavours is huge involving very high quality ingredients from all over the world and setting them apart from their competitors. Perhaps an obvious import is Belgian chocolate but one of the ingredients is birch sugar from Finland, for example. They even grow their own rhubarb for the rhubarb fudge. As well as a rich dairy version of the fudge there is an oat milk based version which tasted convincingly very like the original dairy fudge. All the fudge is cut by hand with an enormous Japanese knife. Although they have supplied Harrods in the past the fudge is now sold through fairs and Shows as it allows the company more control of their ingredients and prices. Flavours included chilli, ginger fudge, liquorice fudge, mango fudge, chocolate fudges and heaps more as well as the more conventional vanilla. At the end of the tour we were able to sample as many flavours as we wanted. What more could we ask for. A very enjoyable visit. This was followed by lunch at a local pub. The ideal finish to the day. Our WI now has members from not only Shimpling and Alpheton but Long Melford, Cavendish, Glemsford and Lawshall. We warmly welcome woman of all ages to come and sample a couple of our meetings. We meet on the second Tuesday of the month at 7.30pm, alternating between Alpheton and Shimpling village halls. 
