#### Report from Chair, David Dunkley:

The Chair reported at the Annual Parish Assembly; Good evening, everyone and thank you for joining us tonight at the Annual Parish Assembly.

For those of you who don't know me, my name is David Dunkley, and I am the Chair of the Parish Council.

This evening is an opportunity to thank the people who have helped to keep the village running and in good order throughout the past year. Most of those people do so as volunteers, i.e. unpaid, a situation some villagers

occasionally fail to appreciate. But without those volunteers Shimpling would be a less pleasant village.

So let me start by thanking my fellow Councillors for their help and assistance during the year. We have had some long meetings, due to the number of items up for discussion, but the hidden side of the work is the considerable background reading and co-ordination meetings, with other councils and service providers, that are needed.

Our clerk is Natasha Byford, and the Parish Council could not run without her hard work and persistence throughout the year. Parish Clerks do an essential and important job providing continuity, legal and procedural expertise and advice to councillors and we are extremely lucky to have Natasha. This year has been a particularly challenging one for Natasha as she has had to deal with all the usual work, significant extra work with grant applications as well as an addition to her family, Oliver. So, a big thank you to Natasha. Alongside the Parish Council are many individuals and organisations, some represented here tonight so I will let them tell you of their activities, all working hard to keep the village clean and looking pleasant, providing useful information to residents and delivering companionship, fun and entertainment. My apologies now if I do not manage to include everyone who has helped.

Litter pickup day is an annual event which is well supported by the village. This year, for the first time, it was organised by Gail Singfield. Throughout the year Steve has also provided an ongoing rubbish and tidy up service on his regular walks around the village.

Setting up the Christmas tableau and generally helping fix

and put things up has been done by Laurence Rooke, Ted Pine, and Matt Brown amongst others. With this year's Christmas tree being generously donated by Mark Milhench. Thanks also go to Chris Cooke from Lark Valley Landscapes and his employees for their efforts in keeping the village grass looking good.

The WhatsApp group, the email group, the village website and, not the least, the village newsletter, guide people to our key hubs of activity; St George's Church, the Bush public house and the Village Hall. Many thanks to Sarah Smith for all her hard work in putting such a professional looking and useful village magazine together.

The Village Hall Committee continue to do a great job of introducing new events to bring our community together as well as continuing with ones which are popular. You will hear more about these from Carol Squire later. The Parish Council is pleased in its continuing support of the village hall to ensure its continued success.

Whilst the configuration of the new local government structure is still to be determined for our region, it is almost certainly going to change the relationship the Parish Council has with the higher tiers of government. This makes it all the more important to thank our County and District councillors for the help and support they have given over this year and previous years.

Richard Kemp, Stephen Plumb and Michael Holt, we thank you for always being responsive to our requests for help; it is much appreciated.

We have seen the successful completion of some important projects throughout the year. The new Village Hall lease has

been signed giving tenure on the land around the Village Hall for the next 21 years. Many thanks to the Richards' family for agreeing to this.

The solar panels on the Village Hall were installed and have been working well to provide a reduction in energy costs. Although the cost of the project was over £13,000 the net cost to the parish was zero, due entirely to the great work done by Natasha in getting a range of grants.

Other projects are progressing well, such as the introduction of Electric Vehicle chargers at the Village Hall. This is awaiting a revised survey prior to implementation. Gerry Shrimpton has been instrumental in getting us this far. Gerry has also been working to get extra buses for the village. This year saw an additional service introduced, but we are hoping for more.

The Neighbourhood Plan is on track. The resident survey produced some very useful information from the over 100 replies. The responses were fed back at an open day attended by 61 residents and will inform the remainder of the process to generate a plan to go Babergh later this year. The team is me, Jane Wall, Mark Beaver, Mike Fahie-Wilson and is very ably led by Claire Douglas-Hughes. A lot has been achieved but there is still a lot to do.

Finally, I would like to add. The Parish Council occasionally make donations for specific causes we believe important to our village heritage. We were offered the opportunity to provide a plaque by the friends of Lavenham Airfield. In WWII the airfield used land across Lavenham, Cockfield, Alpheton and Shimpling.

The airfield was used by the US 487th Bomber Group and there is a memorial there honouring the 233 aircrew who died on missions from the airfield between 1944 and 1945. We are proud to be able to add to that memorial.

Given we have just remembered the 80th anniversary of VE day, it seems poignant that we have a particular example of the sacrifices made in achieving it.

#### Recycling

Please remember that the Parish Council receives money from the paper (although not cardboard) glass, clothing and shoes deposited in the recycling bins near the Bush Inn. Clothing and shoes should be bagged before depositing in the clothing/shoe bank. This income helps to run the council and therefore is a direct benefit to the village. Please keep recycling.

# NEWS FROM THE LONG MELFORD PRACTICE (NOW UNITY HEALTHCARE)

Unity Healthcare Launches New Remote Site
This month, Unity Healthcare is opening a new, purposefully
designed remote site to improve the way in which requests and
queries are managed across the practice.

As a newly merged organisation covering a wider area and serving more patients, this central hub will play a key role in coordinating patient care more effectively. It is expected to make things run more smoothly and ensure fairer access to services

for all our patients – goals that we have been striving towards since the beginning of the merger.

We've recently received feedback from some patients highlighting concerns around accessibility and response times - areas we recognised might be difficult to manage consistently without the introduction of a new operating model. By centralising and streamlining certain processes, the practice aims to address these issues by providing quicker, more consistent responses. Whilst the way that patients contact and interact with the practice will remain the same, these internal changes should improve the overall experience for everyone. Some adjustments may be necessary as the new model is implemented, but immediate improvements are expected, along with longer-term benefits, particularly in areas such as staff recruitment and retention, which will help us to deliver a high standard of care. We've been keeping our Patient Participation Group (PPG) informed about these changes and the anticipated positive impact, and we'll continue working closely with them and listening to patient feedback to ensure our decisions are in line with what matters most to our patients. In addition, local workshops will be held for patients interested in learning more about how eConsult works and how it can improve access to healthcare services. For those with questions about the system, information will be available to explain how it benefits both patients and the practice. Further updates will be shared through surgery communications. We hope that our patients will share our view that this development is an exciting milestone, and an important step forward in working towards improving the care and services we can offer.

11th March Meeting

This very moving talk was courageously given by Pauline Headland, another of our very own members. Many of us were



unaware of the story which she had to tell and we all hold her in deeply respectful loving compassion having heard about the lives of her two treasured daughters, Victoria and Katie born in the 1970s who passed away at the ages of 20 and 21 respectively. Both suffered from a rare degenerative genetic syndrome called Sanfilippo disease. Pauline told us about this and other genetic diseases and how they are carried in recessive genes by both parents.

MPS is an overall name for conditions including Sanfilippo Syndrome. The MPS Society charity will be the BBC Lifeline charity on May 25th. Pauline spoke to us about the disease in order to raise some funds to give to the charity.

#### 8th April Meeting

We were enthralled and concerned in equal measure by Jonathan Houseago, our speaker for a talk about hedgehogs. The little creatures themselves enchanted us all, but statistics troubled us; since 2000, rural populations have declined by at least a half and urban populations by up to a third. We learned what we can all do to try to help reverse this decline, by not keeping our gardens manicured, having wildlife ponds, having log piles which we keep moist and having hedgehog houses in our gardens.

# HARTEST AND DISTRICT GARDENING CLUB Looking back...

April's talk was by Mark Mason who took us on a fascinating journey through the history of tomatoes. From its origins in the Americas, where it was cultivated by the Aztecs, to its current popularity in



Mediterranean and Italian cuisines - despite some initial reservations in Europe over its resemblance to poisonous plants from the nightshade family.

The evolution of the vast range of modern varieties of tomatoes has been shaped by cultural preferences and the evolution of agricultural practices. Whether one is growing or eating them, it was a wonderful insight into how this red fruit has won a central role in our lives!

There was no meeting in May, but we did have **our fantastic plant sale on Sunday 18**<sup>th</sup> **May.** Thank you to everyone who supported the sale on the village green – we had a great turnout and huge volumes of plants and cuttings, making over £900 for the club! It was a super opportunity for everyone to pick up some garden bargains, get some gardening tips and catch up with fellow plant lovers.

A huge thank you to All Saints PCC who provided refreshments and delicious cakes – the proceeds of which (circa £200) are in aid of the church.

Hot on the heels of the plant sale was a visit to Benton End on Monday 19<sup>th</sup> May to the beautiful garden of the celebrated artist and plantsman Sir Cedric Morris (1889 – 1982) and artist, Arthur Lett-Haines. Due to the recent warm weather, many of the irises were in full bloom so we were very lucky to catch them at their best.






