Shimpling Parish Neighbourhood Plan

Thank you again to everyone who was able to drop into the Feedback Event in the Village Hall on Saturday 1st February.

The Event was feeding back the results from the Survey undertaken in September 2024. We delivered the survey to 187 households. We received 106 responses. 61 people attended the Feedback Event. As you will see, the last four boards gave

visitors the opportunity to "vote" for proposed Aspirations and Actions that the Committee drew from the results of the Survey carried out in September 2024.

For all 26 of the Aspirations and Actions there were between 19 to 33 votes in support. 5 of the proposed aspirations/actions were "not supported" by 1 to 6 people.

Following the results from the Feedback Event the Committee's next step will be to meet again with the Consultant to discuss what planning policies should be included in the Neighbourhood Plan. The consultant will then draft the report for feedback, before it is submitted to the District Council, then for Independent Examination, before the final Parish Referendum.

We hope this will be completed within the next year and appreciate everyone's interest and support throughout this process.

Shimpling: landscape and history.

The following is extracted from a Landscape Assessment of Shimpling which was commissioned by Shimpling Parish Council from Landscape Architect Lucy Batchelor-Wylam as part of the process of producing a Neighbourhood Plan. Her full report will be available on-line later in the year.

Shimpling lies across a rolling, shallow valley landscape, in the upper reaches of the Chad Brook valley. The rolling topography [referred to locally as the Suffolk Alps] is a key part of the parish's scenic distinctiveness. The Chad Brook valley feeds into the Dedham Vale Stour Valley National Landscape, downstream an area designated for its traditional, scenic lowland valley character, the setting to many a Constable and Gainsborough painting. Higher in the valley, traditional meadows are absent and modern farming has been able to take more hold of the landscape. Nevertheless, there is evidence that the landscape in Shimpling was noted as being of higher value. The recently replaced 2006 Babergh Local Plan defined a 'Special Landscape Area', (SLAs) that covered most of Shimpling and five of the adjoining parishes to the west and south.

Shimpling is an ancient, agricultural landscape. Bronze age finds and ancient earthworks indicate people have been living here for thousands of years, making use of the water supply from the Chad Brook, and the plentiful supply of wood that would have been present in past centuries. It was known as 'Shimplingthorne' in times past and still features ancient remnants of woodlands and hints of a medieval deer park. Ashen Wood, Bavins Wood, Aveley Wood and Hospital Grove are designated Sites of Special Scientific Interest.

Shimpling retains a strong connection with farming and agricultural development. Lime-rich loamy and clayey soils make it good farming country, particularly suitable for cereals. Owing to the quality of the soils, enclosure of agricultural fields happened early in this area of Suffolk. Shimplingthorne became enclosed well before the 18th-century enclosure acts.

History

The village has a dispersed settlement pattern. There is a small cluster of settlement near the church in the south of the parish, and there are two clusters in the north. There is a small group at Slough Hill, but the bigger grouping along Shimpling Street is the only one to have a defined Local Plan settlement boundary.

Settlement developed around the medieval manors Chadacre Hall, Shimpling Thorn, and Shimpling and Gifford's Halls. The church and hall at Shimpling Hall were two of the earliest buildings. The Suffolk Landscape Character Assessment states, "In the Suffolk landscape there is a recurrent pairing of medieval churches and manorial halls, usually in prime valley side locations close to a water supply. The halls were often surrounded by water-filled moats in the 13th or 14th centuries as an indication of their status, but the actual 'hall-and-church' clusters are probably older. Evidence from Suffolk and elsewhere in England suggests that these clusters originate in the Late Saxon period (c.AD 850-1066), when the possession of a church was one of the indicators of thegnly rank."

Simon Knott's Churches of Suffolk records The Church of St. George has an impressive setting at the end of avenue of lime trees. There are twelve trees, perhaps representing the apostles or the twelve tribes of Israel. The building we see today is essentially 14th century, though it retains an earlier 13th-century doorway which has a frieze of traditional Norman dogtooth decorative carving. A comprehensive restoration in the 1860s swept away many medieval features but stained glass windows endure from this time.

The church of St. George is a Grade 1 listed building and there are 19 Grade 2 listed buildings in Shimpling.


The Halifax family, who built and lived in Chadacre Hall in the 19th century, left a significant mark on Shimpling. Chadacre Hall was previously the seat of the Plampin family. Thomas Hallifax (d.1850) was a wealthy London banker and his family became significant local benefactors. After building a new Regency-style mansion in around 1834, he created the designed parkland landscape around it. The family built a village schoolhouse, a schoolmaster's house, other houses in the village, a coal house, as well as helping pay for restoration work to St George's church. (Shimpling no longer has a

primary school - it closed in 1989 and instead Shimpling's children attend primary school in Lawshall).

During the 20th century the Hall was the base for the Chadacre Agricultural Institute, opening in 1921 under the custodianship of Earl Edward Cecil Guinness, the first Earl of Iveagh. He was born in 1847 in Dublin and was fourth in line to the Guinness dynasty. His interest in agriculture led him to found and endow the Chadacre Agricultural Institute in Shimpling. Lord Iveagh believed in the need to provide sound practical training for people working in agriculture and it was one of the first such institutions in the UK. At its inception its purpose had been to provide 'free agricultural education for the sons of farm labourers, small-holders and small farmers together with the sons of those engaged in trades ancillary to agriculture in Suffolk and neighbouring counties'. The Institute closed in 1988 and the estate went into private ownership. In the late 19th century, the main village cluster was almost entirely linear although a handful of cottages had been built on Gents Lane. The two separate clusters west of Slough Hill and Shimpling Street had already developed. Settlement was surrounded within a network of small fields, radiating out to the north and south, often arranged along a common axis. The positions of individual trees on these early OS maps is known to be reasonably accurate, so views out of the village at this time would have felt quite wooded.

The pattern of the settlement has not changed fundamentally over time and the village retains its core identity as a historic linear

settlement. Gaps in the road frontage have gradually been filled in, and a small modern estate was added to the east, Halifax Place and Streetfield Close sometime in the 1950s.

Report from Chair, David Dunkley:

The Chair reported;

Cllr Dunkley's read the below report from his last couple of months as Chair:

The Budget for 2025 has been derived and agreed and is to be confirmed later in this meeting. As with most, if not all, councils the overall size of the budget has again risen to cover the increased costs of most of the services being provided. Naturally, all services have been reviewed to see where, if possible, savings could be made.

A significant effort from the Neighbourhood Plan group produced a survey document, which was distributed to the village in November. The response was very encouraging with over 100 respondents. Analysis of the responses has produced some interesting results, which will be fed back to the village at an open event at the village hall in early February.

It was hoped that I would be able to announce the completion of the work to produce a new Village Hall lease. However, the work continues.

The agreement to provide EV charge points at the Village Hall is progressing as expected and there are no issues identified at this time.

Over the past few months, the information for regional and central government around the re-organisation of local government has intensified. At this point there is no certainty on what this will finally look like, but will share what information we receive with the village.

SPEEDING IN THE VILLAGE

It has been brought to our attention that there are an increasing amount of vehicles speeding through our village. The Parish Council have invested in two speed indicator devices in order to deter such antisocial behaviour, but unfortunately this is still a very serious problem through Shimpling. Speeding endangers everyone on the road: In 2022, speeding killed 12,151 people. We all know the frustrations of modern life and juggling a busy schedule, but speed limits are put in place to protect all road users. Multiple residents have reported that they have the number plates from the few serial offenders of speeding and we have urged them to report them to the police. Please reduce your speed through our Village to protect all our residents.

BE SAFE - BE SEEN!

In these dark mornings and evenings it's more important than ever that dog walkers, runners, bike riders and other 'non-vehicle' road users can be seen to be safe. There are many places through and around the village where there is no



footpath or even a grass verge to be a safe place to walk or run which means you have to be on the carriageway. Those of us of a certain age can remember the old public information films that recommended you 'Wear something white at night' so that you could be seen by vehicle drivers – that still applies now and there are many readily accessible and easily wearable 'hi-vis' garments for both humans and animals, plus a dazzling array of flashing, blinking and multicoloured lights to make sure you (and your dog) can be seen from a distance.

Wallace and Gromit

Much as I enjoyed watching Gavin and Stacey at Christmas, I laughed even more watching Wallace & Gromit's 'Vengeance most Fowl'. I loved its Britishness - for example the jokes about the Yorkshire / Lancashire border; I delighted in its ridiculousness - for example the racing canal boats being outpaced by a granny; and I appreciated the tongue-in-cheek references to various action movies.

At one level the plot was very simple - Wallace and Gromit rescue the situation when robotic garden gnomes get nefariously programmed into 'evil mode'. But there were more subtle philosophical perspectives too. For example, rather than merely coming out as pro or anti-technology (and particularly for or against artificial intelligence), we are led to understand that the intent of the user is more important than the technology itself.

Furthermore, despite Wallace's love of technology, he ends up affirming that his relationship with his (admittedly amazing) dog is ultimately worth more than the benefits technology can bring. At a time when some fear the dehumanising effects of Al, let us be reminded that there will always be something special about us simply because we are human - made in God's image as spiritual as well as physical beings, and morally accountable accordingly. Indeed, I hope that when we finally meet our maker we will hear him say the equivalent of: 'Well done lad'.

December 2024 saw Shimpling and Alpheton WI members proud to celebrate our 75th anniversary as a branch as we did it in style combining it with our Christmas celebratory meeting! We were joined by past members who helped to make it the branch which it has become today. We met at Alpheton village hall,



gaily festooned with decorations, especially eye catching bunting reflecting the WI's brand colours and sparkling table decorations made by committee member Gill Leggetter. Fabulous entertainment was provided by Bures and Sudbury Mandolin Ensemble with additional guitars and harp! On display were a super montage of our branch over the years and also two certificates congratulating us on our special anniversary. Thank you WI for all that you have meant to women in this area for the past 75 years! Here's to the next 75 years! January 2025 What a moving and inspiring talk we were treated to this evening! Carol and David Dunkley, themselves Shimpling residents, are puppy trainers for Guide Dogs for the Blind. They brought their current trainee puppy called Fern along to meet us all At the age of 10 months she proved to us that she is well on track to becoming a very important centre of someone's life. Since 1931 the charity has partnered 36,000 blind or visually impaired people aged between 14 & 98 years with a guide dog. From birth to retirement it costs over £54,800 to fund each dog. The dogs do not all go on to become guide dog companions for adults, some become buddy dogs for children, whilst some of the best go on to become ambassador dogs helping volunteers to tell the charity's stories. Puppy raising is followed by advanced training before working life and finally retirement with their owners or other caring people. The puppies go to the volunteer puppy raisers around 9 weeks of age. This means that there are important basics for each dog to learn as soon as possible: sit, down and stand as well as learning their own name at the start. The training with the puppy raisers continues for 15 - 18 months and is done via positive reinforcement with food and toys, and the calm kindness of Carol and David in the room towards Fern was clearly evident. Socialisation is an important part of their progressive training incorporating encountering new smells, sights and noises etc whilst walking in town, going into a shop or cafe. Distraction is important - the dog can see something but must ignore it! A rug put down for the dog suggests to them that they must be quiet and calm. To introduce confidence for the possibility of future air travel the raisers take the puppies on visits to Stansted airport and Duxford. The aim is to give exposure to as many different circumstances as possible, including escalators, busy cities and even glass lifts. Our speakers were excellent, but it was not only their talk which was inspiring but all that they have done in raising seven guide dogs which have changed the lives of seven blind people for the better over the past twelve years. We are proud to have such selfless work going on quietly within our own community.

February 2025 This evening Tania Thompson, one of our own members, spoke to us about Community Nursing as part of the Sudbury Integrated Neighbourhood Team and her work as a registered community nurse as well as her healthcare career which led up to this role. Her talk had several fascinating strands; firstly about the little girl who dreamed of becoming a nurse and started the journey of realising that dream by training at Essex County Hospital in Colchester. This was followed by 5 years working as a district nurse in the 90s when this role was not thought of as 'proper' nursing. From this she went on to have a long career in senior management within the private healthcare sector but Covid brought her and many others within the healthcare system to breaking point and in 2021 her management career came to an end. In its place she worked at St Nicholas Hospice and then went back to the NHS as a community nurse.

This led to another strand of Tania's talk, explaining what Integrated Neighbourhood Teams are and what they do. They are multi disciplinary which means that the team members include not only community nurses, but also occupational therapists, physiotherapists, GPs, social workers and phlebotomists. The team work together to prevent further healthcare needs, reducing inequalities and developing new strategies such as the 'virtual ward' .Access to their care which is only for the housebound is made by referrals from GPs, social workers, therapists, concerned friends and family members or

self referral. Tania then went on to explain the range of treatments which might be included in their work. It's a full-on job and the community has a lot to be thankful for that they are there for us when we need them. As for this evening's very enjoyable presentation, we all learned so very much and we are proud of our Tania and all that she does.

We warmly welcome woman of all ages to come and sample a couple of our meetings. We meet on the second Tuesday of the month at 7.30pm, alternating between Alpheton and Shimpling village halls.

HARTEST AND DISTRICT GARDENING CLUB Looking back...

We started the new year programme in January with a very special visit from Tom Hoblyn who shared his experiences "Designing Gardens for RHS Chelsea."

Tom is famed for creating intimate and enduring gardens and has won numerous medals, including an RHS Gold Medal in 2022 and a Silver Gilt Medal at the Chelsea Flower Show in 2023.

Tom runs an award-winning garden design and landscaping practice in Bardwell and therefore knows the challenges of our
