

As you can see from the thermometer, we are pleased to report that a further £11,000 has been raised since the last Shimpling Magazine was published. Our latest total is £33,006! An amazing achievement in such a short time.


Thank you to all those who supported the Sale Trail/Spring Market in any way on the 13th April. We raised over £400 for the window fund.

Rosemarie Sadler, who has been submitting our grant applications, has also been successful in securing grants from Suffolk Historic Churches, Suffolk County Council, The Hallifax Trust and the Helen Roll Charity. We hope to hear positively from other grant applications in July/August. Our church insurers, Ecclesiastical Insurers, who were voted Which Best Home Insurers in 2023, also have a scheme running at the moment which donates £130 to church funds if you buy home insurance from them and are a new customer. Please consider them when you next renew your home insurance.



We have received quotes from four specialist contractors for the repairs to the stained-glass window and surrounding stonework and the PCC and architect are working through these and will appoint the contractor shortly. We still hope to commence with the work in September.

Report from Chair, David Dunkley, at the meeting held on the 13th May:

The Chair reported;

Cllr Dunkley's read the below report from his last couple of months as Chair:

Good evening, everyone and thank you for joining us tonight at the Annual Parish Assembly.

For those of you who don't know me, my name is David Dunkley, and I have been Chair of the Parish Council for the past year.

It's been a challenging year in some ways. There has been a lot of activity from the Parish Council without seeing an obvious outcome. At least not yet. I will expand on that later. The work of the council has also become more difficult due to the limited number of Councillors, which has affected when we can conduct our meetings and how many activities we can take on.

So in saying that, I would like to very much thank the other Councillors for their help and assistance during the year. Particularly Liz, Gerry and Nathalie.

Nathalie Brown has decided to stand down as a councillor and we thank her for her enthusiasm and effort since joining in 2020. The good news is that Nathalie is continuing as Chair of the Village Hall committee. Also, Hans Engstrom ceased to be a Councillor this year. I am sure to concentrate

his time on his commercial interests and we wish him well this those.

The Parish Council could not run without Natasha Byford, our Clerk. We would all like to thank her for her hard work throughout the year. Parish Clerks do an essential and important job providing continuity, legal and procedural expertise and advice to councillors and we are very lucky to have Natasha. Yet again the Council have received an excellent external audit report, due almost entirely to Natasha's efforts.

Many organisations help to keep Shimpling informed and involved with the activities going on in the village. The WhatsApp group, the email group, the village website and, not the least, the village newsletter guide people to our key hubs of activity; The St George's Church, the Bush public house and the Village Hall.

The Village Hall Committee continue to do a great job of introducing new events to bring our community together as well as continuing with ones which are popular. The Parish Council is pleased to be able to support the village hall wherever we can to ensure its continued success. To that end we have assisted with funds for additional Fire alarm equipment and new external pillar lights in the driveway to improve safety levels at the site.

There are many people that we would like to thank and my apologies if I do not manage to include everyone who has helped make Shimpling a better place for its residents.

Sarah Smith, for all your hard work in producing such a professional looking and useful village magazine.

Laurence Rooke, Ted Pine, and Matt Brown for helping fix

Also, our County and District Councillors, Richard Kemp, Stephen Plumb and Michael Holt who provide significant help and advice to the Parish Council Thank you for always being responsive to our requests for help; it is much appreciated.

I said earlier I would expand on the areas that have not yet shown an outcome.

The Neighbourhood Plan is progressing well and is about to issue a survey so that the residents can let us know what they think about particular ideas. The responses will be key to informing the final plan. Other documents have been created by external consultants, but these are in draft form currently. The team is me, Jane Wall, Mark Beaver, Mike Fahie-Wilson and is ably led by Claire Douglas-Hughes. A lot has been achieved by there is still a lot to do.

At the Village Hall there are two areas which are progressing but without conclusion:

Installing an Electric Vehicle Charge Point. Gerry is leading on this and we hope for conclusion this year.

Village Hall lease. This is with the lawyers and although there are no known issues between the two parties, it drags on. Hopefully this will be concluded very soon.

Please remember that the Parish Council receives money from the paper (although not cardboard) glass, clothing and

shoes deposited in the recycling bins near the Bush Inn. Clothing and shoes should be bagged before depositing in the clothing/shoe bank. This income helps to run the council and therefore is a direct benefit to the village. Please keep recycling.




An update from Little Saplings Preschool



Shimpling Parish Neighbourhood Plan

Following a successful open event at the Village Hall in October; which set out the



importance of having a Neighbourhood Plan, namely to give the community a voice for the future with regard to planning matters as well as facilities/amenities; the inaugural meeting of the Neighbourhood Plan Committee took place in January.

Since then the first part of the Landscape Assessment has been produced in draft and a Building Design Criteria consultation has taken place and the first draft received. The Committee are also working on producing a Survey which will provide all residents within the Parish the opportunity to give their opinions and views. The Committee hope this will be finalised and circulated with the Village Newsletter in the Autumn. It will also be available to complete online.

Every individual in each household can complete the survey - the more the merrier! - as the Neighbourhood Plan must be prepared with community input, support and consultation - so we hope you will all complete the survey to help shape the future of our village.

Dr David Brandon the Clinical Lead for the combined practice. Recently I had the pleasure of meeting the Long Melford Patient Participation Group along with the GP Federation's Chief Executive David Pannell. This article is a summary of what David and I said at the meeting.

Who we are?

Suffolk GP Fed is a community interest not for profit healthcare provider. We are owned by the GP practices in Suffolk. We run a range of clinical services including podiatry and GP Out of Hours. The Federation also manage Unity Healthcare which is a large GP practice in Haverhill. Like Long Melford, Unity has faced many challenges but is now stable and is rated by the Care Quality Commission as Good.

Why merge Long Melford/Lavenham and Unity?

General practice is under well publicised pressures including a shortage of GPs. Long Melford had specific challenges and could not continue as it was:

Dr Browning has indicated he plans to retire and Dr Cross did not want to run the practice on her own. The practice was unable to recruit additional GP partners. In addition, no neighbouring practice wanted to merge.

Well publicised issues with the Care Quality Commission.

A gap between income from NHS and costs of running practice

We agreed the only way of retaining services was by a merger. The plan was to implement this later in the year but we accelerated the timetable in order to give certainty to staff.

Progress so far

The practices formally merged on 1 April and is now known as Unity Healthcare. We have a combined senior clinical

leadership team including Dr Browning under a single Care Quality Commission registration.

We have a significant list of actions. Crucially we need to merge the two clinical systems at end of month which will allow us to work as one team.

The plan going forward

Some things will not change. Most importantly, we will retain provision of services at Long Melford and Lavenham, and patients will not be expected to travel to Haverhill (and vice versa). However, over time some things will need to change. We will work with the Patient Participation Group before these happen. Any change will be communicated in advance.

How services are delivered will evolve in the future. We need to broaden the practice team to include greater use of pharmacists, paramedics and other roles. We have already started to use new technology, for example new patients can register online via our automated system.

In the future we intend to work with your Patient Participation Group to expand the use of e-Consult as the way to access services. We also want to expand the number of GP trainees we have as they often stay when qualified. Finally we will be starting an investment programme in both buildings shortly.

Concluding observations

We realise change is difficult but merger was the only option to retain services at Long Melford and Lavenham. We have pledged to work closely with the Patient Participation Group and will communicate changes openly and honestly. Looking forward, the merged Unity will be much stronger and sustainable in very difficult times for Suffolk general practice.


