We need a new Parish Councillor to join our team. Parish Councillors do a worthwhile job ensuring that your voice is heard and overseeing work so that your village is kept looking good. Report from Chair, David Dunkley:

The Chair reported in the September meeting; We have now completed all of the paperwork for the introduction of EV Car Chargers at the Village Hall. However, we are still awaiting a date for the installation work to be started. Hopefully this will be forthcoming soon.

The new bus service now commenced, albeit with some initial issues around driver training as to the exact routes to be used. This should settle down quite quickly and become a very useful and much improved service from that previously provided. It needs to be reminded that the use of this service will be monitored over the coming year and should reasonable levels of use not be met, we could lose it. An improved bus service was just one of the Community Actions identified in the village survey, undertaken last year, as part of the production of a Neighbourhood Plan, the first draft of which was reviewed last week. Alongside this the Design Codes and Guidance and the Landscape assessment are now in final form and will be uploaded to the website this week. It feels with the reorganisation of local government; the completion of the Neighbourhood Plan is even more important as a way of showing local wishes.

I am sure everyone has noticed the telephone box library is resplendent in a new coat of bright red paint. I would like to thank David and Linda Campan for their hard work on this project. Also, all of our noticeboards have been refurbished courtesy of Councillor Rooke. We now just need to sort out the problems with the village hall.

I don't have any real update on the where devolution and local government reorganisation, but I suspect by the next meeting there may be greater clarity.

Recycling

Please remember that the Parish Council receives money

from the paper (although not cardboard) glass, clothing and shoes deposited in the recycling bins near the Bush Inn. Clothing and shoes should be bagged before depositing in the clothing/shoe bank. This income helps to run the council and therefore is a direct benefit to the village. Please keep recycling.

Shimpling Parish Neighbourhood Plan

The most important piece of news since the Autumn Newsletter is that we are pleased to report that the Parish Council have agreed to fund the final part of getting the Neighbourhood Plan approved – thank you to the PC for their continued support.

The Committee has also received the draft Neighbourhood Plan from the Consultant and fed back amendments required. The report was then circulated to the Parish Council who confirmed they were happy with the draft so far.

The next step is for the Report to be put out for the Village to review. This will take place at the Village Hall on Saturday 17th January; timings to be confirmed but it will be a similar format to the previous events where you can drop in as and when to see the information and the Committee members will be on hand to answer any questions – and thank you with a cup of tea/coffee and biscuits for turning out!

Following this event the Report will then be submitted for Independent Examination before the final Parish Referendum.

We are making good progress and are on the home straight. We hope to see as many of you as possible on the 17th January - reminders of the event will be sent out nearer the time but do put it in your diary now!

From 31st August there will be a no 45 bus service from Sudbury to Bury St Edmunds and return travelling through and via Tesco, Sudbury, Melford, Bridge St., Shimpling, Lawshall, Hawstead and Low Green. An additional stop to the previous route is scheduled at West Suffolk Hospital.

PRESS RELEASES FROM TRINITY HEALTHCARE

It is now nearing 18 months since Unity Healthcare were asked to take on the running of Long Melford and Lavenham surgeries, and I hope you'd now agree that despite some initial challenges we have now settled into more of a rhythm that is offering you a responsive and accessible service.

With the majority (approximately 85%) of you contacting us via eConsult (via the practice website, or via the NHS App), this then frees up the telephone line for those of you that cannot do so. This means that we have some of the shortest telephone wait times out of any GP practice.

Our triage process that then takes place in the Haverhill Triage and Operations Hub allows us to identify quickly what you need, how urgently, and with which clinician, so that we can do our best to deliver this efficiently for you as possible.

Our expanding clinical team manage approximately 1800 incoming contacts per week, and the vast majority have their needs addressed within 5 working days (with urgent contacts managed same day).

There has been much in the national news about the challenges GP practices are facing, about contract changes, opening times and staffing pressures, but you can be assured that we have this well under control and are in an excellent position.

Our focus going forward is to improve the "customer service" experience, so that the care you receive from us is not only responsive but is also of a consistently high standard. Part of this includes learning from YOU, so it would help if you can share your recent experiences of care from us so that we can learn both from when it has gone well, and from when it has gone less well. Unity Healthcare — which serves Haverhill, Long Melford, Lavenham and surrounding villages — will merge with Glemsford Surgery next month. The merger is taking place to increase patients' access to a wider range of healthcare professionals and help reduce waiting times. Unity Healthcare currently has around 26,500 patients and last year merged with the nearby Long Melford Practice. From 3 December, Glemsford Surgery, previously managed by the West Suffolk NHS Foundation Trust, will be overseen by the Suffolk GP Federation.

It will remain open to patients, with face-to-face appointments where appropriate. Dr David Brandon, Clinical Lead at Unity Healthcare, said: "By bringing our teams together we can offer patients access to a broader set of health professionals and make it easier to get the care they need. Services for Unity patients will continue as usual." Dr Melissa St Ledger, Clinical Lead at Glemsford Surgery, said: "We know change can raise questions. Glemsford will stay open and patients will still be able to be seen at the surgery. Working with Suffolk GP Federation will help us strengthen local GP services."

Ed Garratt OBE, Chief Executive of the Suffolk and North East Essex ICB, said: "The GP Federation has done a

magnificent job in Haverhill and patient access, quality, safety, and clinical care are vastly improved since it took over Unity. I am confident that they will now drive improvements too for patients and staff at the Glemsford Surgery."

Further patient information will follow via usual channels, including details of a Glemsford engagement event and how to submit questions or feedback. Patients are encouraged to use these routes to keep phone lines available for clinical enquiries.

SHIMPLING DEFIBRILLATOR

As most people will know, we raised money for the defibrillator in the village and funds raised have lasted until now. However, the insurance is a hefty £300 per annum and this year we were able to renew it with the help of a generous donation.

We approached the Parish Council to see if they would be willing to add it to their Asset Register, disappointingly, they have declined, as they did at the outset, which means that we will need to keep raising funds for the next three years of the current unit. The PC has other plans for after that.

I will be meeting with others from the SAVE committee to discuss what we do next.

Thank you everyone who has always supported our efforts to have a unit in the village.

I will keep everyone informed via the village Round Robin for further developments.

Who is Santa Claus?

When we see Santa Claus in shop windows or on Christmas cards, with his red suit, sleigh, and sack of toys, it's easy to think he's a purely modern invention. But the truth is that Santa's story reaches deep into Christian history — all the way back to a kind bishop who lived more than 1,600 years ago. Saint Nicholas was born around 270 A.D. in what is now southern Turkey. He became Bishop of Myra, and was known for his compassion, fairness, and generosity. The most famous story tells of how he secretly gave three bags of gold to a poor father so his daughters could marry and avoid poverty. Legend says he dropped the gold down the chimney — where it landed in their stockings by the fire - leading to today's traditions of stocking and 'secret Santa'.

As his legend spread through Europe, Nicholas became "Sinterklaas" in Dutch. When Dutch settlers moved to America, his name softened into "Santa Claus." In the 1800s, Santa got a makeover: he was dressed in fur, given a sleigh and reindeer, and made to live at the North Pole. Later, illustrators like Thomas Nast and advertisers such as Coca-Cola helped fix his modern image — round, rosy-cheeked, and dressed in red. Saint Nicholas reminds us that Christmas giving isn't about spending money — it's about sharing love quietly and freely, and expecting nothing in return. Indeed, generosity is at the heart of Christmas, when Christians believe that God gave his Son to a troubled world. I do hope that, whatever November and December brings, you can give and receive something of that love this Christmas. You would be most welcome to any of our services including beer and carols at The Bush on Friday 12th Dec at 8.00pm, and our carol service at St Georges Shimpling on Christmas Eve at 6.00pm.



Readers may have noticed that the copse at the top of the hill on the footpath leading from Gents Lane was cleared of its non native trees earlier on this year, and we can now reveal the plans for that area! John Pawsey from Shimpling Park Farm asked the Greening Shimpling group whether we would be interested in helping

with the replanting of that area. We jumped at the opportunity and since then have had several meetings to discuss and plan. John explained that this is part of the Landscape Recovery Project – a project with a wonderful vision for creating 'productive farmland and rich habitats woven together with over 100 miles of wild, green veins', a 'landscape buzzing with life – ponds glistening in field corners whilst the call of turtle doves and nightingales can be heard once again. Farms are thriving, locals are enjoying wild green spaces....'

This replanted copse would be just a small, but vital part of that vision, helping to connect the many hugely important wildlife corridors around our predominantly agricultural landscape. We have met to decide which trees and shrubs which will work best with our current (and future) climate and the soils in that area, all with a purpose of providing a rich and diverse natural habitat. The area has been carefully mapped, to accommodate the different types of trees (at least 16), and the next step will be to clear the area and plant over 300 whips!


We hope to move any logs, branches etc over to a site near the pond, to provide habitat for small mammals and insects, and then start planting in January and to add bird boxes to existing mature trees in that area.

This will be a project which we hope will be one that the whole village can benefit from, particularly those who enjoy walking the footpaths which cross John's land or just looking across
